Presenter Biographies

David Rice is a freelance interpreter in the Chicago area, a staff interpreter in secondary and post-secondary classrooms, and has served on the Board of the Illinois Registry of Interpreters for the Deaf. In the Summer of 2018, David went back to school to get his M.A. Degree in Interpreting Studies from Western Oregon University. As part of his graduate school education, David has studied Demand Control Schema in depth and has been trained in leading supervision sessions. David Rice has also given workshops on topics including assignment preparation, freelancing, educational interpreting job searching, taxes, and how to continue to grow your interpreting skills after graduating from an IEP.

Spending most of his adult life working in the field of interpreting, Marcus S. Gunter understands the value of post-assignment reflection. He has obtained his AA degrees in Liberal Arts and Sign Language Interpreting from American River College, Sacramento, his bachelor's in Deaf Studies from California State University, Northridge, and is currently working on his Master of Arts in Interpreting Studies-Teaching at Western Oregon University while working in the community as a certified sign language interpreter and instructor. Marcus studied Dean and Pollard's Demand Control Schema intensely during both IEPs he attended. He also has had training in applying the DC-S in leading Supervision sessions. By bringing his two worlds of teaching and interpreting together, he is focused on providing tools to interpreters in the field to promote development.
